Greetings to all,

The parable of the workers in the vineyard in this Sunday's gospel has always sounded familiar to me but has not always been my favourite. I still remember when I was young, my mum used to quote this parable whenever my siblings and I argued about who got the biggest piece of cake for dessert. Mum said, "The last will be first, and the first, last". Subsequently, my youngest brother, of course, was the one who had the biggest piece. We were all whining "Mum, it is not fairmrrr"? we thought bigger kids probably deserved more than the little ones.

Most of us react instinctively against any form of behaviour that we consider unfair. If we think we were treated unfairly we can feel especially irate. It is probably that instinct in us that leaves us feeling a bit uneasy about the story that Jesus tells in this Sunday's gospel reading.

We can easily sympathize and grumble alongside the labourers in the parable who worked all day, asking why those who worked for one hour would receive the same payment as those who have borne the heat and burden of the entire working day. We feel it was unfair for those who worked all day long.

Yet, employing this story, Jesus was perhaps showing that the God whom he calls 'Father', was not a God of strict justice, as humankind understands it. God's generous spirit is so great that it cannot be confined within the limits of strict human justice.

In the parable the landowner gave a day's wages to those who worked for a day; they received a just wage, the wage that had been agreed upon at the beginning of the day. However, the landowner chose to be exceptionally generous to those who worked only an hour, giving them a day's wage too. He chose to pay all the workers a living wage, even if they hadn't earned it.

Jesus reveals a God who wants to be as generous as possible with the gift of salvation, the gift of life. God does not relate to us based on what we have earned or deserved. God relates to us out of such a greater generosity which is beyond human understanding; God gives us life in abundance as a gift. What we have done to earn it is not ultimately decisive. Rather than being disturbed by such a parable, it can be heard as good news for us all. God relates to us in this way to inspire us to be generous in our dealinas with each other as God is with us.

LITURGY NOTES: UNDERSTANDING OF THE EUCHARIST CELEBRATION

The Introductory Rites at Mass

The Introductory Rites at Mass consist of entrance song, greeting, penitential act or blessing/sprinkling of holy water, Gloria and collect prayer. The two essential elements are the first and last of these.

The purpose of the Introductory Rites is to gather people as a worshipping community and prepare them to listen to God's word and celebrate the Eucharist worthily.

The entrance song begins the Mass and announces that we are here to worship God as members of the Body of Christ, so it is very important that all join in the singing.

The sign of the cross that follows proclaims that we gather to celebrate as a community baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The liturgical greeting ('The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ...') states that the presence and power of the Lord is with the gathered community.



most commonly The used form of the penitential rite is option C. It is an acclamation of he mercy and compassion of God ('You heal the wounds of sin and division'), not a

time for self-accusation.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal describes the Gloria as 'a very ancient and venerable hymn the text of which may not be replaced by any other text'.

The final element of the Introductory Rites, the collect or opening prayer, begins with the invitation by the priest 'Let us pray'. In the silence that follows we offer our own prayers which are gathered up in the words of the collect.

The three Archangels Michael, Gabriel and Raphael are the only angels named in Sacred Scripture and all three have important roles in the history of salvation. Saint Michael is the "Prince of the Heavenly Host," the leader of all the angels. His name is Hebrew for "Who is like God?" and was the battle cry of the good angels against Lucifer and his followers when they rebelled against God. He is mentioned

four times in the Bible, in Daniel 10 and 12, in the letter of Jude, and in Revelation. Saint Gabriel, whose name means "God's strength," is mentioned four times in the Bible. Most significant are Gabriel's two mentions in the New Testament: to announce the birth of John the Baptist to his father Zacharias, and the at Incarnation of the Word in the womb of Mary.

Saint Raphael, whose name means "God has healed" because of his healing of Tobias' blindness in the Book of Tobit. Tobit is the only book in which he is mentioned. His office is generally accepted by tradition to be that of healing and acts of mercy.
